



- Children are welcomed and encouraged to join us in the worship service. We provide a nursery for infants on the main floor and childcare for toddlers in the basement for the duration of worship.
 - Pre-K Activities: Following the Passing of the Peace, Pre-school through Kindergarten aged children are invited to line up in the Narthex for class lasting until communion.
- · As you may have noticed, many of the lectionary texts for the weeks preceding Advent begin taking up Advent themes of Christ's second coming, which lead to Reign of Christ the King (next Sunday) and then to the first week of Advent.
- "Creator of the Stars of Night" was a Latin plainsong chant for Advent evening services. The original text—Creator alme siderum—dates from somewhere between the seventh and ninth century. It was translated into English by Anglican priest John Mason Neale, who is known for his many translations from Latin to English, including: "All Glory, Laud, and Honor," "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," and "Of the Father's Love Begotten." It is one of the few chant texts in Protestantism (outside of the Anglican communion) that has retained a chant (plainsong) tune.
- The bulletin artwork is a Japanese icon of the archangel Michael from the book of Daniel depicted as a samurai warrior.

Ordinary Time is the span of the church calendar that runs between Eastertide and Advent. It received its name not because of it's ordinariness, but from the word "ordinal" which simply means counted. It is the time also known as the Season of the Church where we celebrate the growth and mission of the Church through the work of Christ. Because the themes of growth and new life are so prevalent, the color of the season is green.
