


We are an imperfect community striving to live into the beautiful story of God in our wonderful yet broken city. We invite you to join us as we seek God's glory and neighbor's good together!

- Children are welcomed and encouraged to join us in the worship service. During the summer, we provide a nursery for infants (unstaffed) on the main floor and childcare for toddlers in the basement for the duration of worship. There is also a "quiet space" in the back of the sanctuary where children are welcome to play.
 - Pre-K Activities: Following the Passing of the Peace, Pre-school through Kindergarten aged children are invited to line up in the Narthex for class lasting until communion.
- "What We Need is Here" is a song by Amy McCreath whose words were taken from the end of Wendell Berry's poem "The Wild Geese": "And we pray, not / for a new earth or heaven, but to be / quiet in heart, and in eye, / clear. What we need is here."
- The song, "Many and Great, O God," was written by Joseph Renville who was a Native American guide and fur trader of French-Dakota descent. It's tune name comes from lake Lac Qui Parle that is located near the present-day South Dakota/Minnesota border, from where the song originated. Oral tradition tells us that it was the song sung by 38 warriors as they were executed by government officials in Mankato, Minnesota on December 26, 1862, the largest mass execution in U.S. history and a reminder of the long history of injustice perpetrated to this day against Native American/First Nations peoples in our country.
- The bulletin artwork is entitled "Sermon on the Mount" by English painter Thomas Saunders Nash.

Ordinary Time is the span of the church calendar that runs between Eastertide and Advent. It received its name not because of its ordinariness, but from the word "ordinal" which simply means counted. It is the time also known as the Season of the Church where we celebrate the growth and mission of the Church through the work of Christ. Because the themes of growth and new life are so prevalent, the color of the season is green.
